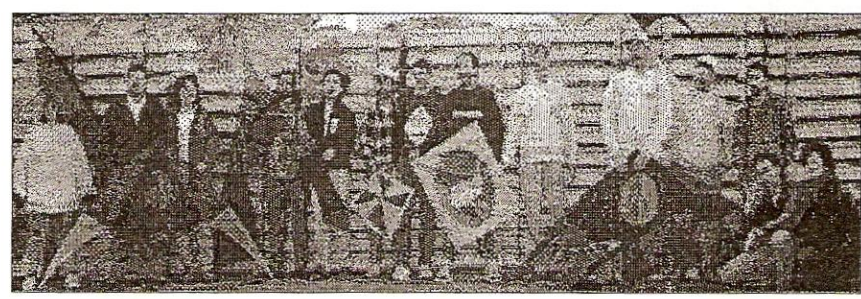




First Indoor Fun-Fly at Lakehurst
